

Stockton's Day of Scholarship to Showcase Faculty, Staff and Student Research Projects

Presentations, Poster Sessions, Keynote on Grant Writing to be Held April 1

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Galloway, NJ – Stockton's 16th Annual Day of Scholarship will showcase distinctive research projects and collaborations between students, faculty and staff from all fields of study at Stockton University on **Friday, April 1 from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.**

Nearly 50 presentations from each of Stockton's seven academic schools will highlight the pillars of the university's mission for excellence in teaching through learning, engagement, global perspectives and sustainability.

The event provides an overview of the projects that took place during the past year including grant-funded projects, internally funded projects, research endeavors, professional development, sabbaticals, study tours and academic achievements.

Stockton invites community partners and the general public to join for President Harvey Kesselman's opening remarks over breakfast at 8:30 a.m. in the Campus Center Event Room.

Meg White, assistant professor of Education, will give the keynote address, "A Tail of Two Grants: Developing a Multi-Stage Project," about the grant-writing process.

"The presentation will explore approaching grant writing in multiple stages," said White, whose current grants are supporting an Urban Teacher Academy in Atlantic City schools this summer.

"I received back-to-back internal funding for the project; one grant supported the first stage, which consisted of researching Urban Teacher Academies in the state to gain a greater understanding of program structure and implementation at other universities in New Jersey so that I could create the foundation for the one here at Stockton. The second grant will support the camp itself," she explained.

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White said the third stage of her approach is to seek external funding to continue projects in the future.

Research presentations include, “The Best and Worst of Our Digital Future,” “Targeting Schools: Predictors of Terrorist Targeting of Educational Institutions,” “Poetry and Older Adults” and “Small Mammal Response to Different Pinelands Forestry Management Practices.”

Other research topics include the Holocaust, psychology, health sciences, environmental sciences, criminology, gender in advertising, a demographic profile of the New Jersey State Legislature, trading patterns during the financial crisis, and an analysis of Twitter networks of libraries in research institutions.

Presentations will be held from 9 – 11:50 a.m. and 2:05 – 3:10 p.m. in the Campus Center and F-wing.

Poster presentations will be held from 11:20-11:50 a.m. in the Campus Center Board of Trustees room and will be on display all day.

The keynote address will be held 3:15-4:30 p.m. in the Campus Center Event Room.

PechaKucha will be held from 1-2 p.m. in the Campus Center Event Room. PechaKucha, which originated in Tokyo, is a fast-paced presentation style in which 20 slides are shown for 20 seconds each, totaling six minutes and 40 seconds.
