Some of the benefits include a more effective and efficient delivery of services to the community, implementation of policies and procedures that are conceptually sound and operationally effective, establishment of agency goals and objectives, streamlined operations, improved officer morale, and the establishment of excellence and professionalism in the agency. The accreditation process will require a long term effort from the Stockton College Police Department.

COMPUTER AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES

Network Enhancements

Effective February 2, 2004, Richard Stockton College's NJEdge net connection was completed giving the college full access to the statewide higher education network. Resources now available include Internet2, IP video conferencing between member institutions, and enhanced bandwidth capabilities to all members of NJEdge net. More information concerning NJEdge net can be found at www.njedge.net.

On February 19, 2004 HERB MYERS, Professional Services Specialist 2, Computer Services, attended the Data Resource Group meeting of NJEdge. Topics included Network Monitoring Tools to troubleshoot video issues, Tools for Diagnosing Network Problems, Internet 2 Resources and Quality of Service Analyzers.

On February 26, 2004, Richard Stockton College received full certification, from the NJEdge net video portal, to use our Video Conferencing Units on the statewide higher education network. The portable video conferencing system, which is available through the Media Center and a fixed unit in the President's conference room are fully certified and available to use for IP videoconferencing between member institutions.

Web Enhancements

An online application that enables students to submit housing renewal applications over the web was developed for the Office of Housing and Residential Life.

Lab Hardware and Software Upgrades

New computer workstations have been installed in D-026 computer lab. Workstations from the D-026 lab have been placed in E-012 creating a new 14 seat walk-in lab for student use.

Hitachi Starboard Pilot

The electronic podium in D-027 has been replaced with a Hitachi Starboard. The use of the Starboard in D-027 will serve as a pilot test to determine whether the new equipment should be used in other electronic classrooms and labs on campus. The Starboard provides the features of an electronic whiteboard, (i.e., using an electronic pen to annotate the projected image), but can also simply function as a computer monitor for those who don't wish to use the additional features.

FACILITIES PLANNING AND CONSTRUCTION

Housing I Exterior Repairs 2004 Update

The contract for the 2004 Housing I Exterior Repairs was awarded to the low bidder, Axios, Inc. The cost for this project is below the amount approved by the Board of Trustees. Two thirds of the funding for this project will be available from the Higher Education Capital Improvement Fund (HECIF) when a bond is sold by the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority (NJEFA). This is the third and final phase of the Housing I Exterior Repair project. It consists of replacing exterior walls, windows, doors, and entrance lights for the four buildings in G & H Courts of Housing I. On site construction will begin on May 7 with a completion date of August 15, 2004.

Housing II Shower Improvements Update

The College accepted bid proposals for the replacement of Housing II shower facilities on March 9, 2004. Currently, the architect and the College are reviewing the low bid proposal. The low bid is within the budget approved by the Board of Trustees. The project consists of rebuilding 31 shower areas in Founders Hall at the Housing II dormitories.

Academic Fire Suppression System Update

On February 27, 2004, the New Jersey Department of Treasury's Division of Property Management and Construction (NJDPMC) signed a contract with ABJ Sprinkler Co., Inc. for the installation of fire suppression systems in the College's academic facility for \$1,409,000. This life/safety project consists of installing a fire suppression system in Buildings 30, 31 and 32, A through M-Wings. The Higher Education Capital Improvement Fund (HECIF) project is within the budget approved by the College's Board of Trustees. Most installation work for this project will take place during the evening hours, except where scaffolding is required for installation, such as the A-Wing Lecture Hall and the I-Wing gymnasium.

Spillway Replacement Update

An application for this project was submitted to the Pinelands Commssion on July 8, 2003. The Pinelands application for rehabilitation of the Lake Fred spillway and dam, which does not meet the minimum requirements of the Dam Safety Standards, remains under review by the Pineland's Commission staff.

Upper and Lower K-Wing Renovation

The College sent a request for professional proposals to five firms for the renovations in upper and lower K-Wing. Martin Blumberg Architect, who submitted the lowest cost proposal, was assigned this project. The renovation includes the construction of a Development Office and Academic Affairs Office in the western and central section of Upper K-Wing, and the renovation of the existing Development Office and the Performing Arts Office in lower K-Wing. If code review approvals are obtained, this renovation will take place in July and August following the occupancy of the E/G-Wing Bridge. A budget will be established following a review of schematic drawings for costs by users for furnishings, telecommunications, and Plant Management construction costs. If the budget exceeds \$100,000, Presidential and Board of Trustees' Audit and Finance approvals will be requested.

Housing II Exterior Wall Remediation Update

The proposal for the purchase of approximately 820 windows was received and opened by the College on March 8, 2004. The College will receive bid proposals for the windows, replacement of dryvit walls, and masonry walls on March 30, 2004. Construction for this remediation project is targeted to begin in early May 2004. This construction project consists of replacing approximately .4 miles of exterior walls on three floors in Housing II and regrading of the adjacent site.

Academic Exterior Repairs and Replacement

Construction activities on this Higher Education Capital Improvement Fund (HECIF) project continued through the winter. The steel is erected for the B, F, H, J, & K Wings egress stair towers. These towers are scheduled for completion in July. The E/G Wing bridge steel has been erected, the concrete floor has been poured. The aluminum curtain wall framing, glazing, and HVAC ductwork have been installed, and the interior studs for the walls constructed. Completion of the 16 faculty offices is scheduled for the end of June. New exterior light fixtures have been installed in the J/K-Wing courtyard. The C/D-Wing connector's aluminum curtain wall and stair risers have been installed. Faulty glazing has been replaced throughout the campus. Patching and replacement of the deteriorating exterior porcelain enamel panels is ongoing.

F-Wing Extension and Renovation Update

The New Jersey Division of Property Management and Construction (NJDPMC) signed a renegotiated professional service amendment with Geddes, Brecher, Qualls, Cunningham (GBQC) on March 4, 2004 for F-Wing Extension and Renovation. A preliminary schematic design has begun for a 29,000 square foot extension of F-Wing. This facility will primarily consist of electronic classrooms, a computer laboratory, and faculty offices.

Housing I HVAC Update

The New Jersey Division of Property Management and Construction (NJDPMC) will accept professional proposals for the Housing I HVAC replacement on March 23, 2004.

PLANT MANAGEMENT

300,000 Gallon Storage Tank Repairs

The replacement of the exterior coating system on the College's potable water/fire suppression tank has been completed. CHARLES JACKSON, Painter Crew Supervisor, took the lead in contract administration after receiving assistance with the bidding and specifications writing process from MARK ZORZI, Professional Services Specialist, Purchasing Department.

Applying the coating system during the winter months to eliminate condensation due to high humidity worked extremely well. The decision to paint without draining the tank saved thousands of dollars and considerable time.

The \$55,000 project was completed on time and under budget without the use of professional consultants. Close scrutiny from the Department of Environmental Protection was used to protect the environment and the health of all employees from lead poisoning.

Merger

The Plant Management/Housing Maintenance merger has commenced at the direction of RICHARD HALE, Vice President of Administration, Finance and Institutional Advancement and JOSEPH MARCHETTI, Vice President for Student Affairs. A thirty-day notice was given to all affected employees in a question and answer session held on March 5, 2004 in the Lakeside Center.

Coordination of the merger has been undertaken by NATALIE HAVRAN, Director of College Personnel Services, ELAINE GRANT, Director of Housing and Residential Life, and KEN JOHNSON, Director of Plant Management.

Possible benefits are the reduction of maintenance vehicles needed, elimination of the need for additional Central Stores space, elimination of the need for Safety and Security space, reduced purchase of maintenance equipment and materials, and elimination of certain positions.

Press Box

In an effort to support Athletic Department programming, Plant has completed the renovation of the existing soccer field press box. Retrofit glazing, additional counter space and communications capabilities were added.

The press box was the latest in an extensive and ongoing athletic improvement project that commenced in 2002. These improvements have been undertaken to protect the limited resources of the College and expedite the work by using in-house labor and the College's annual permit.

PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

The Stockton Performing Arts Center has again been designated by the New Jersey State Council on the Arts as a Major Presenting Organization in the state. This is the seventh consecutive year that the PAC has been recognized by the New Jersey State Council on the Arts for maintaining a solid history of artistic excellence, substantial programming, and broad public service. This high honor was bestowed by a panel process and means that the Stockton Performing Arts Center stands among a group of organizations across the state which comprise anchor institutions that contribute vitally to the quality of life in New Jersey.

Michael Cool, Executive Director of the Stockton Performing Arts Center, along with Marketing Director, Charles Lounsberry, attended the presentation ceremony in Trenton at the State House, on Tuesday February 24, 2004.

In addition the New Jersey State Assembly honored the Stockton Performing Arts Center with a commendation for its leadership role in the arts.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

OFFICE OF ALCOHOL/DRUG PREVENTION

The Office of Alcohol/Drug Prevention hosted Lynne Stennet of Seabrook House on February 17, 2004, to provide an overview of its services to the staff of the Wellness Center. Seabrook House sponsored a luncheon for the participants. Seabrook House, located in Cumberland County, is considered to be one of the top-100 alcohol/drug inpatient treatment centers in the nation.

OFFICE OF ATHLETICS AND RECREATION

The Stockton men's basketball team, coached by GERRY MATTHEWS, Head Men's Basketball Coach, finished the 2003-04 season with a 16-12 overall record. The Ospreys finished third in the New Jersey Athletic Conference Gold Division with a 7-6 league record and were eliminated from the NJAC Tournament with a 72-64 loss to The College of New Jersey. Stockton received an invitation to the ECAC Metro Championship and defeated Mount St. Mary College (New York) in the first round before being eliminated by New York University in the semifinals.

The Stockton women's basketball team, coached by **JOE FUSSNER**, Head Women's Basketball Coach, finished the 2003-04 season with a 12-14 overall record. The Ospreys finished third in the NJAC Gold Division with an 8-5 league record. Stockton qualified for the NJAC Tournament for the fifth consecutive year and was eliminated in the first round with a 59-58 loss to William Paterson University.

The Stockton men's indoor track and field team, coached by BILL PRESTON, Coordinator of Cross Country/Track and Field Operations, and the Stockton women's track and field team, coached by TODD CURLL, competed in five meets during the 2003-04 season. The Osprey women's team placed third and the men's team finished sixth at the NJAC Championships on February 22.

Senior Christina Mason was selected to the Academic All-District II College Division Women's Basketball Third Team by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Mason was one of 15 players chosen from a ballot of 85 candidates representing NCAA Division II and Division III schools. District II consists of institutions in the states of Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and West Virginia, plus the District of Columbia. Mason was nominated for the honor by CHRIS ROLLMAN, Coordinator of Sports Information and Marketing.

Christina Mason was named to the NJAC Women's Basketball All-Conference First Team and junior Brian Hiltner was named to the NJAC Men's Basketball All-Conference First Team.

Brian Hiltner was named the New Jersey Athletic Conference Men's Basketball Player of the Week on January 19.

Junior Jeanna Morton, sophomores Michelle Britton and Laura Schules and freshman Andrea Burroughs of the Stockton field hockey team were selected to the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) National Academic Squad. Candidates needed a minimum 3.30 cumulative grade point average to be eligible.

Senior Kim Marino was named the Outstanding Female Field Athlete at the NJAC Indoor Track and Field Championships on February 22.

GLORIA MAESTAS, LAMOTT MOORE, CRAIG STAMBAUGH and LAURIE GRISCOM (Event Services), along with several students, made site visits to several college and university student centers during February and March. The purpose of the site visits was to tour recently constructed or renovated student centers and gather information from staff and students. These site visits included Elizabethtown College, University of Maryland (Baltimore County) and William Paterson University.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT Additional "Snapshots" from

OFFICE OF THE SOUTHERN REGIONAL INSTITUTE (SRI) AND ETTC

The administrative offices of the Southern Regional Institute (SRI) and ETTC were relocated in February to the college's Mays Landing facility at 701 Route 50 with a minimal disruption in services. Access to the ETTC's website and database were available within a few hours of the move. Instructional areas should be operational by mid-April.

MS. PATTY WEEKS, Director of the ETTC, and MS. DINA ABBAMONDI, Assistant Director of the ETTC, organized more than 150 programs between February and March 2004 through contractual services and open calendar workshops. Significant programming was provided during county in-service days on February 13 and on March 26, thirty-two individual workshops were provided to the Vineland School District.

The increased volume is further demonstrated when comparing the Final 2002-03 ETTC Hour Utilization figures to the current year through March 2004. In this regard, approximately 10,000 ETTC hours have been used by member organizations through the first three quarters of the fiscal year, and this reflects 97% of the final total used last year.

DR. HARVEY KESSELMAN, CEO for the SRI/ETTC has conducted several programs for school administrators during the last month. Three web-based applications were introduced to Atlantic County Superintendents during "Accessing the Data" hosted by the Folsom School District. Administrators learned how to access disaggregated data regarding their districts from websites and were provided with ideas to disseminate the information to the public.

On February 24, **Dr.** Kesselman presented "Standardized Testing Result Analysis for Improved Student Performance" to more than twenty Ocean County School District teams of educators in Lacey Township. The workshop explored the impact of NCLB legislation on student testing and provided opportunities to analyze individual district scores and develop teaching strategies to address standardized testing. **Dr.** Kesselman offered a similar program to administrators in Orange, New Jersey on March 24.

Ms. Abbamondi coordinated "Assistive Technology Resources for Parents and Educators" at the Hess School in Hamilton Township. The evening program provided presentations and opportunities to review various assistive technology products and

support services in the State of New Jersey. Nearly 100 educators and parents attended this event.

A one-day conference held on March 26 at the Townsend Residential Life Center entitled "Why Study Black Studies: The Status of the Discipline in the State of New Jersey" attracted 125 educators from both college and K-12 faculties. Conference Director, DR. PAT REID-MERRITT, Professor of Social Work at Stockton College, led participants through a series of discussions with academic leaders from across the state that focused on how local educators and students can integrate the history and culture of African Americans into school curricula.

The Fifth Annual Conference on Bilingual/ESL Special Education was held at Stockton College on March 30, 2004. A panel of national leaders shared their expertise on current issues in the field of bilingual and ESL education with 150 educators in the A-Wing Lecture Hall. Panelists included representatives from the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, and the Office of Special Educational and Rehabilitative Services, US Department of Education. MR. ALEX MARINO, Director of Carnegie Library Center Operations, facilitated the event on behalf of the SRI.

The Fourth Annual "From My Classroom to Yours" Conference will be held at Stockton College on May 10, 2004. This yearly program hosted by the SRI/ETTC attracts 400 educators from across the state. The day-long conference includes 64 individual workshops, a keynote presentation and a vendor fair.

SUMMER TERM TUITION AND FEES EFFECTIVE FOR SUMMER 2004

WHEREAS,	the Board of Trustees adopted in April 1987, a tuition policy which affirmed the college's adherence to the following policy principles: 1) maintain a strong commitment to access, excellence, and increasing minority enrollments; 2) maintain a commitment to facilities maintenance and educational support; 3) develop and maintain an appropriate working fund balance, and 4) maintain or improve the academic index of regular admission students, and
WHEREAS,	the Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility to ensure that institutional resources match and advance institutional goals and priorities to enable the effective accomplishment of the college's mission, and
WHEREAS,	in recognition of the amount of State budget support as recommended by the Governor, the Board of Trustees has determined that, in order to meet institutional goals and priorities, an increase in summer session tuition is required, and
WHEREAS,	the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey Board of Trustees is responsible for ensuring that certain other Special Use and Nonrefundable Fees are applied when appropriate, now therefore, be it
RESOLVED,	that the Board of Trustees, for summer term 2004, approve an increase in undergraduate tuition of \$9.00 per credit, from \$150.00 to \$159.00 per credit hour (and to \$257.00 per credit hour for out-of-state students), and be it further

This project, which consists of miscellaneous HVAC replacements and improvements, has been expanded to install a main campus chill water loop and a cooling tower at the geothermal well fields. The loop will tie into existing underutilized chillers in the Sports Center and K-Wing, which were installed to provide cooling during maximum occupancy in the Sports Center and the Performing Arts Center, and to provide cooling for F-Wing. The cooling tower is required to balance temperatures of the existing geothermal well field where temperatures have incrementally increased annually due to greater demand for cooling than heating in the academic facilities. Also, this tower will be utilized to inexpensively make chilled water during midwinter for the future aquifer storage system, which will provide chilled water to the loop without chillers.


