FISCAL AFFAIRS

Staff Training

From April 2 through April 5, 2006, staff members from the Division of Administration and Finance attended the SunGard Summit in Orlando, Florida to continue their training in the Banner integrated software systems.

Thousands of attendees from colleges and universities around the country participated in hundreds of formal sessions and training classes. "Birds-of-a-Feather" sessions were available as well, bringing users together to network and share their personal knowledge of Banner software programs.

Those attending the summit were **ANNETTE HAMM**, Purchasing; **ROBERT HEVALOW**, Fiscal Affairs; **MARY HUGHES**, Accounts Payable; **TRISH KREVETSKI**, Budget; **BROOK LEW**, Fiscal Affairs; **MIMI MILAZZO**, Bursar's Office; **JASON MILEWSKI**, Fiscal Affairs, Foundation; **JOAN PARKER**, Bursar, and **LISA WOODWARD**, Controller. Other staff from around the college attended as well. All returned with new ideas for improved operational efficiency and management of fiscal resources.

System conversions that are currently taking place at Stockton include Fixed Asset tracking, Accounts Receivable, and automated payroll deduction for alumni pledges made directly to the Office of Advancement.

Individual contacts made at the conference continue to prove a valuable resource for one-on-one assistance between systems users, and are especially helpful with regard to issues unique among similar colleges.

Paypath System

The implementation of the Paypath system has been well-received and has already helped advance the College's level of fiscal efficiency. The Office of Fiscal Affairs reported a savings of \$228,929.00 in merchant credit card fees for the five month period since the system was introduced.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Our employees are truly our most important resource, a fact that was reinforced on Thursday, May 4, 2006 when 154 employees were honored for their service to the College at the Annual Employee Recognition Breakfast and Program. Organized by the Office of Human Resources, NATALIE HAVRAN, Director, emceed the event. Dr. HERMAN J. SAATKAMP, JR., President began the program by thanking the 154 recipients, as well as the overflow crowd of their co-workers. The highlight of the program was the gift presentation and recognition for both years of service and retirement. Gifts were presented by the President and Divisional Vice Presidents.

MGT of America, Inc., a consultant hired to perform a review of the management and an operation of the College's Department of Human Resources, has completed the second phase of its review. During the month of May, MGT of America, Inc. performed a campus wide user survey eliciting responses relating to the effectiveness and utility of the services provided by the Human Resources Department. A total of 393 people completed the survey out of 1,081 employees. MGT has also completed a peer review of the Human Resources staffing and functions of eight comparable institutions. A final report encompassing all of the findings and recommendations is expected to be completed by this coming fall.

Staff Training

While not yet six months old, the Training Department of the Office of Human Resources is providing an array of skill building/team building programs and services to the College management and staff. Based on the results of a comprehensive training needs assessment conducted by **GENE SWILKEY**, Training Manager, six training modules identified as high need, were designed. They included *Winning Customer Service*, *Dealing with Difficult Employees*, *Building High Performance Teams*, *Win-Win Communication*, *Managing Change and Decision Making*. To date 102 staff members have attended these programs. In addition, customized team building workshops were facilitated for the leadership teams of the Campus Police Department and Housing & Residential Life. The overall focus of the Training Department is to provide high quality, high priority training initiatives that build the overall staff skill set, while at the same time remaining sensitive to the requirements of College operations.

CAMPUS POLICE

The Office of Campus Police hosted the College's annual emergency exercise tabletop drill on May 8, 2006. It was attended by all the branch, section and unit leaders identified in the

Emergency Operations Plan, as well as members from the New Jersey State Police, Atlantic County Office of Emergency Management, Galloway Township Police Department, the Red Cross, members from the Stockton College CERT Teams, and many others. An after-action report is being completed and will be forwarded to the President for his information.

In April, 2006, Police Sgt. **JOHN FORTE** attended a one week course on *Campus Threat* and *Risk Assessment* held on the New Brunswick campus of Rutgers University.

Police Sgt. MARIA PARZIALE attended a two day seminar in Florence, New Jersey on *Accreditation Assessment*, and subsequently became certified as an Accreditation Assessor for the State of New Jersey.

In April, 2006, Chief **GLENN MILLER** and Deputy Chief **JOE MANGIELLO** attended a two day seminar on *Leadership* held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, and sponsored by the New Jersey College and University Public Safety Association (NJ CUPSA).

In April, 2006, **LINDA SHEA**, Technical and Management Information Systems analyst in the Office of Campus Police, attended a one day seminar in Atlantic City, New Jersey titled, *The Exceptional Assistant*.

The Department recently bid Officer MICHAEL PRICE farewell, and thanked him for his dedicated efforts on behalf of the emergency preparedness plan for the campus and the community. He is wished well as he assumes a new position with a local municipal police department.

During the May 30 through June 4, 2006 golf tournament at Seaview Country Club, Campus Police worked with the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) assisting with all their parking needs on campus.

On May 31, 2006, Police Sergeants **JOHN FORTE, CARLTON FERNANDERS**, and **MARIA PARZIALE**, attended a one day CUPSA-sponsored supervisory seminar on *Risk Management, Leadership, and Ethics*, hosted by Rider University.

On June 7, 2006, Sgt. **CARLTON FERNANDERS** and Sgt. **MARIA PARZIALE** received the Department's Meritorious Service Award for volunteering to assist victims of Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans in 2005.

The Department also wishes to congratulate Police Officers CINDY PARKER and LINDA KENNY on their completion of the 300 mile Police Unity Tour Bicycle Ride from Linwood, New Jersey to Washington D.C. from May 10 through May 12, 2006. Over 140 police officers from New Jersey participated in this year's annual event which raises money for the police memorial in D.C. The Department wishes to thank the entire Stockton Community, especially the Office of Administration and Finance and the Housing Office for their support.

FACILITIES PLANNING AND CONSTRUCTION

F-Wing Extension and Renovation Update

This project is on target for a completion date of June 2006. The project's arts inclusion portion, consisting of the mosaic tile on the exterior wall of F-Wing, was completed in April. Furniture was delivered at the end of May and landscaping will be completed by the end of June.

Sports Center Video Projection System

The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (NJDCA), Bureau of Construction Project Review, has approved the project and permits are forthcoming. The contractor, Video Corporation of America (VCA), is providing and installing a state-of-the-art video and projection system to include both Room M205 and the arena of the Sports Center. Project completion is anticipated for this summer.

Unified Science Building

This project is currently in the final document review period of Phase I of development. The design consultant, EYP, submitted the final draft for the College's review. The resulting document identified approximately 173,842 GSF for a new Unified Science Building that will include classrooms, conference/seminar rooms, computer classrooms, teaching and research laboratories. The consultant also provided the College with an initial cost estimate of approximately \$385 per square foot. The square footage cost will be refined in Phase II which will include schematic design, design development and construction documents. In addition, the College plans to engage the services of a Construction Manager (CM) in Phase II of this work. The CM will also provide the College and the Design Consultant with independent cost estimates.

College Center

The Office of Facilities Planning and Construction, along with the Selection Committee which consisted of members of the College community, recommended Bovis Lend Lease to the President and Board of Trustees as the Construction Manager (CM) for this project. Once the CM is on board, the College will then request an independent assessment and cost estimate of the project. As soon as the CM has provided this, Phase I of the project will be complete. The project architect's space needs analysis is nearly complete. The next stage of this work will be to continue to Phase II which will include schematic design, design development and construction documents.

Academic Exterior Repairs and Replacement Update

The replacement of the exterior panels in N-Wing and the Performing Arts Center (PAC) is continuing as planned. The work is performed in phases in order not to disturb any activities in the PAC. The original August completion schedule is still valid.

Building 30 Standby Generator

The standby generator is operational and supports the Computer Center functions located in D-Wing. Final commissioning and training of Plant Management personnel is ongoing and will be completed by early June.

Housing V Update

Hillier Architects completed the design of the new parking lot and the project has been advertised for bids. Bids are expected in June with completion of the parking lot by fall semester. The four (4) housing units are in the preliminary design phase which will incorporate the requirements by the College for operation, maintenance and student use. This portion of the project is scheduled to be advertised this summer.

Athletic Fields at Pomona Road and Field #4 Surface Parking

The College has contracted Langan Engineering and Environmental Services to provide the design services for the new athletic fields which will be located on Pomona Road next to the existing baseball/softball fields. This project includes two (2) lighted and irrigated fields with artificial turf and one irrigated natural turf field, as well as restrooms, parking and a storage facility. Additionally, this project will include the surface paving and drainage of the existing Field #4 adjacent to Parking Lot #4. This parking surface will provide parking for 250 cars and will provide the College with an additional entrance from College Drive. These projects will be designed in 2006 with the construction bid documents expected by early spring 2007. The project is anticipated to be completed in late 2007.

Structured Parking Garage

The program phase for the project has been completed and has been presented to the Board of Trustees. The orientation of the building along with walkways and paths connecting the parking structure to the main campus complex at N-Wing has been sited and planned out for design. The engineering firm of O'Donnell and Naccarato will be submitting a cost proposal this fall.

Potable Water Feasibility Study

The feasibility study submitted to the College by Vinokur-Pace has been reviewed by members of the departments of Facilities Planning and Construction and Plant Management. Additional data was requested from the engineering firm before the study was accepted. An addendum to the preliminary report is expected in early June.

Holocaust Resource Center Addition

In addition to the Design Committee, this project also has a "Survivor's Committee" which was selected to provide additional input to this project. Code review was successfully completed and the architect, Blumberg Associates, is proceeding with the schematic design.

Nacote Creek Environmental Station Rehabilitation & Upgrade

The architectural firm, Cody Eckert & Associates of Princeton, New Jersey, was awarded the design contract in March. Their engineering consultant, Schoor DePalma Engineers and Consultants, will provide services to include septic and potable water designs, permitting, site surveying and development, as well as mechanical, electrical, plumbing and structural design. The project is currently in the schematic design phase. Design completion and construction documents for bidding are expected this summer. The first phase of this project will address the approximately 600 square foot classroom addition to Nacote Creek. Construction will be phased to accommodate the building occupants.

Alton Auditorium Renovation & Upgrade

The project, which includes improvements to lighting, HVAC quality, room acoustics, public entry, and the additional smart classroom technology, is in the bidding stage for architectural services. The design portion of this project will take approximately six months, with an additional ten months to complete construction.

M & N-Wings, Arts & Sciences Building Door Replacement

The design of the replacement doors in M & N Wings was submitted to the NJDCA for approval in April. The comments/recommendations have been addressed by the Architect, WSII Architects and Planners, and construction will commence early June.

Upper K-Wing Renovation

A floor plan, approved by the President in March, was forwarded to Blumberg Associates, the architectural firm providing design services for the project. The architect has forwarded signed and sealed drawings to NJDCA for code review. Code review issues are currently being addressed and the design completion is anticipated in early June. A project permit issued by the NJDCA will be forthcoming. Work on this project will be performed by Plant Management personnel and the project is scheduled for completion during the summer.

PLANT MANAGEMENT

Staff/Faculty and Student Seminar

On April 5, 2006 Mr. Michael McGuinness, CIH, presented a seminar titled *How to Deal with Moldy Buildings*, sponsored by the Office of Plant Management and Housing Maintenance in cooperation with Campus Police.

Custodial

In an effort to improve operations and efficiency, the Custodial Section began a program of Quality Assurance Inspection on task-specific daily assignments.

Grounds Shop

The Grounds staff collected approximately fourteen 55-gallon drums of food products at various drop stations on campus and donated the food to the New Jersey Food Bank, South Jersey Chapter. The staff also collected about 50 large bags of student and employee clothing which were given to the Salvation Army Organization of Atlantic City.

On May 7th, Groundsworker **SEAN ALLEN** completed the "Broad Street 25 Run", in Philadelphia, PA, benefiting the Philadelphia Breast Cancer Group. Sean finished the marathon 759th of 14,000 runners with a time of 4 hours, 35 minutes. Good Job, Sean!

As members of the Absecon Saltwater Sportsmen Fishing Club, Senior Groundskeeper **JOHN CHASE**, and Supervisor of Landscape Maintenance, **DAVID ROESCH**, are doing their part to help battle both cancer and drug abuse. The Club sponsors the Greater Atlantic Bluefish Tournament and the "Hooked on Fishing Not Drugs" program, in which the pair will compete. David will also take part in the Jersey Shore Classic Tournament for the Delaware Breast Cancer Coalition, and the Sunshine Foundation Fishing Tournament which supports the "Make-a-Wish" foundation.

The College was recently honored by Pioneer Athletics with the 2005 Field of Excellence Award for athletic field maintenance. Stockton received a certificate of recognition and Field of Excellence banner for field display. Submissions were made from all over the United States and a rigorous judging process yielded 22 winners from a large pool of applicants. Stockton's field was the only New Jersey winner.

OFFICE OF ADMISSIONS

OFFICE OF ATHLETICS AND RECREATION

The Stockton softball team, coached by **VAL JULIEN**, entered the second round of the ECAC South Tournament with a 23-18 overall record. The Ospreys received a berth in the ECAC South Tournament for the second consecutive season and third time in four years. They defeated Lake Erie College (OH) 8-5 in the first round of the ECAC tournament to tie their second-highest win total in school history (23 wins).

The Stockton lacrosse team, coached by **DICK RIZK**, ended its 2006 regular season with an 8-6 overall record and a 5-3 mark in Knickerbocker Conference games. The Ospreys qualified for the Knickerbocker Conference playoffs and then were invited to the ECAC Metro Tournament, which took place on May 12-14. Stockton made its third consecutive ECAC tournament appearance.

The Stockton baseball team, coached by **MARTY KAVANAGH**, concluded the 2006 season with an 18-19 overall record and a 6-12 record in the New Jersey Athletic Conference. The team's 18 wins were the second-highest total in the 13-year history of the Stockton baseball program.

The Stockton men's track & field team, coached by **BILL PRESTON**, and the Stockton women's track & field team, coached by **TODD CURLL**, competed in eight outdoor meets during the 2006 season. Stockton hosted two meets, the Stockton Invitational on March 25 and the Osprey Open on April 8. The men's and women's team both equaled their best finish ever at the NJAC Outdoor Track & Field Championships by each placing second.

The Stockton women's rowing team, coached by **TOM HEWITT**, competed in four regattas during the 2006 season, including the nationally-renowned Dad Vail Regatta in Philadelphia on May 12–13. The Ospreys entered competitors in the women's pair and novice four events.

Val Julien, Head Softball Coach, collected her 300th career victory on April 1 as the Ospreys defeated New Jersey City University 14–2. **Julien** is in her 20th season as the head softball coach at Stockton.

At the NJAC Outdoor Track & Field Championships on May 6, **Todd Curll** was named the NJAC Women's Track Coach of the Year, junior **Paul Klemic** was voted Most Outstanding Male Athlete and senior **Audra Schappell** was chosen Outstanding Female Field Athlete.

Four Stockton track & field student-athletes competed in the prestigious Penn Relays on April 26-29. Junior **Paul Klemic** won the College Men High Jump – Eastern and the College Men Long Jump – Eastern. Senior **Jake Owens** won the College Men Pole Vault – Eastern. Junior **Rich Luettchau** placed fourth in the Olympic Development 10K Racewalk and junior **Lisa Chatman** finished ninth in the College Women's Heptathlon. Senior **Chris Crescenzi** was named the NJAC All-Conference Baseball Second Team and senior **Tara Barker** was selected to the NJAC All-Conference Softball Second Team. To meet the Improving Teacher Quality Partnership overarching goal of improving student academic achievement, the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey intends to partner with two diverse school districts: Wildwood City Schools and the Somers Point School District. The project will provide teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, and preservice educators with a greater knowledge and understanding of mathematics content and pedagogy which are vital to student achievement in the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards. Specific activities will include the delivery of customized professional development (CPD) workshops in mathematics to teachers and principals in K-8, in-class mentoring for novice and veteran teachers, specialized programming for pre-service students, professional development opportunities for paraprofessionals, professional development in related technology, and alignment of all professional development with the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards.

The project will be implemented through three distinct, yet inherently connected entities at Stockton College. The Southern Regional Institute (SRI) for Professional Development, the Southern Regional Educational Technology Training Center (ETTC) and Stockton's Teacher Education Program (STEP) will seek to "enhance traditional teacher training" and provide customized professional development to meet the needs of both partner districts as well as pre-service students at the college.

The Customized Professional Development Model (CPD) will maintain sustained, high quality school-based activities over three years that will lead to improved student performance in the New Jersey Assessment of Skills and Knowledge for grades three, four, five, six, and seven and the Grade Eight Performance Assessment, and provide a strong focus on mathematics instruction in special education classrooms. The CPD model was developed in 2003 in response to the Improving Teacher Quality Partnership Grant and has evidenced and documented success for the past three years in the Buena Regional School District and Atlantic City School District.

This project is expandable across disciplines and can be replicated throughout the State.

Memorandum of Understanding

For July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007

The Educational Technology Training Centers were established by New Jersey Law [P.L.1996, c.129].

The mission of the Educational Technology Training Centers (ETTCs) is to provide ongoing, high quality professional development that is responsive to the educational technology training and curriculum integration needs of educators from all grade levels (K-12) in both public and non-public schools throughout the state. Training activities will be aligned with New Jersey's Core Curriculum Content Standards and pedagogies and instructional styles consistent with life-long learning and distance learning.

This Memorandum of Understanding seeks to clarify the roles, responsibilities and benefits for the Southern Regional Educational Technology Training Center (hereinafter "ETTC") and its lead agency, Richard Stockton College of New Jersey, (hereinafter "the lead agency") in collaboration with the Southern Regional ETTC Steering Committee and the member school districts of the Southern Regional ETTC Consortium.

If the ETTC program continues to focus on the above mission statement and the lead agency continues to support the ETTC in the manner described below in this MOU, then the ETTC will be approved or certified by the New Jersey Department of Education to continue as the designated ETTC for Atlantic County.

To be department approved, the ETTC program must continue to address the following components.

- 1. The Educational Technology Training Center (ETTC) name must continue to be used.
- 2. A "user-friendly" demonstration center must be maintained. The center should include computers, multimedia hardware, software, curriculum-related materials, access to distance learning, etc.; and should have signs designating it as the county ETTC.
- 3. A director/coordinator must be assigned to the program and be responsible for coordinating professional development, addressing needs for technical assistance and related activities at the ETTC. The director/coordinator must attend quarterly meetings as established by the department of education. No substantive portion of the scope of work may be subcontracted to an outside entity.
- 4. The primary target audience continues to be educators; however, workshops and other services may be provided to the larger learning community of parents, families, local businesses, community members, libraries, and other entities.
- 5. Evaluation data about educators participating in ETTC workshops and other training events must be electronically submitted quarterly to the Office of Educational and

Informational Technology. (Such information may include number of workshops held, number of participants, and evaluation of workshops by educators.)

6. The ETTC web site must be maintained with training opportunities updated regularly. (The department's web site will link to the ETTC web site.)

Department approved ETTCs will enjoy the following benefits:

- Eligible for targeted state and federal funding opportunities as the department approved county ETTC;
- Direct assistance from the department in identifying potential private sector partnerships;
- Direct communication maintained with the department on key issues via e-mail, web site links and regularly scheduled meetings to ensure that the ETTCs receive timely information concerning major educational initiatives and potential resources;
- Continued statewide and national recognition initiated and promoted by the department.

This memorandum of understanding must be renewed annually and requires the signature of the lead agency's representative (CEO for the Southern Regional Institute and ETTC) and the Chair of the ETTC Steering Committee to demonstrate commitment to the ETTC mission and program components. When this document is fully executed, the lead agency is eligible for future grants and activities targeted for the ETTC program, if the funding source for the future grant program allows awards to institutes of higher education.

Purpose

To establish a policy for arranging and approving financing transactions that will cause the College to become indebted or contingently obligated to an outside third party. Further, to provide a basis for the prudent use of debt to finance capital projects and facilitate the achievement of strategic objectives. There are practical limits to spending and to the incurrence of debt financing; debt is therefore a resource to be managed.

This policy will be reviewed at least annually to ensure financial and operational flexibility. Management will update the Board of Trustees with an overview of the financial health of the College when proposing additional debt financing.

Introduction

Debt financing allows the College to pay for capital assets over a period of time. This is the best practice for certain types of capital investments when within appropriate limitations and at favorable rates of interest. Debt financing is desirable when borrowing rates are below expected rates of return on investments or when the College invests in capital assets that provide investment returns or cost savings that are greater than the cost of borrowing. Decisions regarding the use of financial leverage should depend on the fiscal health of the College and the effect of today's decisions on future costs of capital.

<u>Authority</u>

The Board of Trustees upon the advice of the President and the Vice President for Administration and Finance. The Vice President for Administration and Finance or designee will manage all funding sources, including debt, for capital projects authorized by the Board.

Criteria for Issuing Debt

The priority of a certain project, the expected use of a facility, and the likelihood that a combination of philanthropy and future budget allocations can fund a portion of the cost of a project are significant factors in determining where issuing debt is the appropriate financing vehicle for the project. Revenue producing assets such as parking facilities and residence halls are prime candidates for debt financing due to their ability to help service the debt. Planned major debt issuance via tax-exempt bonds should relate in

timing and amounts to the adopted Master Plan. Projects will be prioritized if they meet one or more of the following:

- Risk Reduction Test: The project is considered critical in terms of life/safety or is necessary to comply with environmental or legal standards.
- Core Mission: The project ties to the core mission or an academic program.
- Prudence: The project is held to be essential for maintenance and upkeep at agreed-upon levels.
- Self-sufficiency: The project can generate significant revenues to cover the capital and associated costs.
- Savings: Debt issuance can provide for budgetary savings.

Application

As a public college Stockton can issue tax-exempt debt through the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority (EFA); this type of financing will in most cases be the lowest cost funding source for capital projects.

- To maintain access to capital funding the College will issue debt to fund priorities that have been approved by the Board of Trustees
- The credit rating of the College will be actively managed to ensure that the College can continue to issue debt and finance capital projects at favorable interest rates.
- Debt will be managed on a portfolio, rather than a transactional or projectspecific basis. Management's continuing objective of incurring the lowest achievable long-term risk-adjusted cost of capital will be balanced with appropriately limiting exposure to market shifts within acceptable budgetary parameters.
- Working capital requirements, debt management, and the investment of cash should be viewed comprehensively in order to optimize overall funding and investment return strategies.

The structure of any individual transaction (maturity, interest rate, use of derivative products, and other financing structuring) will be based upon overall needs to ensure that the long-term costs are minimized and that overall risk does not exceed acceptable levels.

Debt will be structured to meet the College's long-term goals and therefore each project being financed will be required to provide a comprehensive business plan, including the source of repayment for the debt and appropriate and realistic repayment terms. The repayment terms will require that the loan term is no greater than the expected useful life of the asset being financed.

Financial Ratios

Financial discipline is a critical component of long-term debt management and therefore a limited number of ratios and targets should be established. These ratios will be monitored and reported on as strategic initiatives evolve. This policy establishes guidelines to measure the total amount of debt when compared to College balance sheet resources and the annual operating budget.

 Debt Burden Ratio: To maintain long-term operating flexibility this ratio measure the College's ability to repay debt service associated with all outstanding debt and the impact on the overall budget and includes all activities of the College.

ANNUAL DEBT SERVICE < .09 TOTAL EXPENSES

Aggregated operating expenses are stable and better reflect the operating base of the College. The guideline for this ratio is not to be greater than .09.

 Viability Ratio: This ratio measures financial health by the availability of liquid and expendable net assets compared to aggregate debt. This policy establishes a debt limit of .60 to ensure sufficient balance sheet strength.

TOTAL UNRESTRICTED & TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSTS- NET INVESTMENT IN PLANT > .60 AGGREGATED DEBT

To remain competitive and retain flexibility to invest in future strategic initiatives, the College will maintain a ratio of no less than .60.

In addition to the ratios described above, College management will establish and track additional ratios to enhance debt management.

Funding Sources

Each funding source available to the College has specific benefits, risks, and costs. All potential funding will be reviewed within the context of this policy and the overall portfolio to ensure that any financial product or structure is consistent with College initiatives. Most importantly any financing structure must be fully understood as it relates to the potential risks and benefits and how they impact College creditworthiness and debt capacity.

- Tax Exempt Debt: The College's debt portfolio will be managed to maximize the utilization of tax exempt debt whenever possible. Depending on prevailing market conditions, opportunities, budgetary constraints, the useful life of the project being funded, and other considerations management should consider maximizing the external maturity of any tax-exempt issue.
- Taxable Debt: Should the College's capital projects not qualify for tax-exempt financing, taxable debt should only be used in appropriate cases as it is generally a more expensive source of capital. The issuance of taxable debt will reduce the College's overall debt affordability due to higher associated interest expense.
- Commercial Paper: The College has not utilized this method of financing (both tax-exempt and taxable series). Commercial paper can provide substantial financial flexibility to the College including the ability to manage and optimize cash balances; provide an alternative to lease transactions and other purposes. At this time however the College is not contemplating the use of commercial paper but may explore this option in the future and will be subject to the ratios established by this debt policy.

- Derivative Products: Management recognizes that derivative products may enable more opportunistic and flexible management of the debt portfolio. Derivative products, including interest rate swaps, may be employed primarily to manage or hedge the College's interest rate exposure for a specific period of The College will utilize a framework to evaluate potential derivative instruments through consideration of its variable rate allocation, market and interest rate conditions, impact on future financing flexibility, and the compensation for assuming risks, or the costs for eliminating certain risks and exposure. In addition, the College will analyze and quantify the cost/benefit of any derivative instrument relative to achieving desirable long-term capital structure objectives. Under no circumstances will a derivative transaction be utilized that is not understood fully by management or that imposes inappropriate risk on the College. Risks include but are not limited to tax risk, interest rate risk, liquidity risk, counterparty credit risk, basis risk, and any other potential risks either imposed or removed through the execution of any transaction. In addition, management will consider and disclose the potential impact of any derivative product in the College's financial statements. Management will regularly report on the status and performance of its derivative products. Given the complexity associated with derivative products, they will be considered when conventional financing sources are relatively more expensive (e.g. exceed the portfolio blended interest rate), and can achieve desired financial objectives more efficiently or at a significantly lower risk-adjusted cost than traditional structures. Management is required to present any recommended derivative product to the Finance Committee, a subcommittee of the full Board.
- Other Financing Sources: The College recognizes that various types of financing activities may also impact the College's credit and are often more expensive than traditional debt structures. Therefore, all non-traditional financing structures including guarantees and third party debt can only be considered once the economic benefit and the likely impact on the College's debt capacity has been determined. Specifically, for any third-party or developer based financing, management will ensure the full credit impact of the structure is evaluated and quantified to the extent possible prior to execution and the analysis must be presented to the Finance Committee.

The College intends to optimize the portfolio of debt for the entire College rather than on a project-by-project basis, and takes into account the College's cash and investments. Therefore, management will make decisions regarding project prioritization, variable rate allocation, and financing structures within the context of the overall needs and circumstances of the College.

Variable Rate Debt

It is recognized that a degree of exposure to variable interest rates within the College's debt portfolio may be desirable in order to:

- -take advantage of repayment/restructuring flexibility
- -benefit from historically lower average interest costs; and
- -diversify the debt portfolio; and
- -provide a hedge to short-term working capital balances

Management will monitor overall interest rate exposure, analyze and quantify potential risk, and coordinate appropriate fixed/variable allocation strategies. The portfolio allocation to variable rate debt (potentially new issues and refunding) and the use of interest rate swaps and other derivative products recognizes the desire to manage interest rate risk; the amount of variable rate debt outstanding shall not exceed thirty-five percent (35%) of the College's outstanding debt. This limit is based on the College's desire to limit annual variances in its debt portfolio, provide sufficient structuring flexibility to management, keep the College variable rate allocation within acceptable external parameters, and utilize variable rate debt (and/or swaps) to optimize debt portfolio allocation and minimize costs.

VARIABLE RATE EXPOSURE < .35 TOTAL LONG-TERM DEBT OUTSTANDING

If and when commercial paper is utilized the College will exclude from this calculation project-related commercial paper used in advance of expected long-term financing since it is used for interim purposes and should not be included in the College's desired long-term variable rate allocation calculation. The College recognizes that during some periods it may be desirable to maintain a lower variable-rate allocation within its 35% limit, depending on prevailing long-term rates and/or opportunities in the short-term market.

To mitigate liquidity and interest rate risk, the Vice President for Administration and Finance or designee upon the approval of the Investment Committee will invest the appropriate level of working capital funds in accordance with the Investment Policy to hedge debt interest rate exposure. The intent is not to provide a "perfect hedge" but rather to provide "reasonable" cushion to allow the College to weather unforeseen market conditions.

Refinancing of Existing Fixed Rate Debt

The College should continually monitor the markets for opportunities to refinance eligible existing fixed rate debt for savings. The College should refund fixed rate bonds in advance of their optional redemption date only if present value savings exceed 3% of the par amount to be refunded. If fixed rate bonds are within 90 days of their optional redemption date Stockton should refinance the debt if present value savings are greater than 1% of par. Alternatively, the College could refinance the fixed rate bonds with variable rate bonds within 90 days of the redemption date in an effort to adjust the mixture of fixed and variable rate bonds in the debt portfolio.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY APPROVING THE FINANCING OF TAX-EXEMPT OR TAXABLE BONDS WITH THE NEW JERSEY EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES AUTHORITY; APPROVING THE CONSTRUCTION AND FINANCING OF VARIOUS CAPITAL PROJECTS; APPROVING THE FORM OF AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF THE LEASE AND AGREEMENT(S) AND ALL OTHER NECESSARY DOCUMENTS; AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN OFFICERS OF THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY TO DO ALL THINGS DEEMED NECESSARY OR DESIRABLE IN CONNECTION WITH THE FINANCING AND THE ISSUANCE BY THE NEW JERSEY EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES AUTHORITY OF ITS REVENUE BONDS, THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY ISSUE AND THE LOAN OF THE PROCEEDS THEREOF

WHEREAS.

the Board of Trustees of The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey (the "Board") desires to approve the acquisition, construction and equipping of Student Housing V Phase I and Surface Parking, Parking Structure, Athletic Field and Surface Parking; Renovation of the existing N-Wing; Energy Conservation Projects; Land Acquisitions; Holocaust Resource Center Renovation; Alton Auditorium; and Electrical Upgrade (the "Project"); in an amount not to exceed \$73,240,000 (see Project Priority List #1), which amount does not include related financing costs; and

WHEREAS,

the Public College has determined that the Project will assist in serving the needs of its students and in the operation of the Public College; and

WHEREAS.

the Board desires to approve the revised Project Priority Lists (as hereinafter defined) as attached hereto; and

WHEREAS,

the Public College has further determined that the financing for the Project and related financing costs should be accomplished by the issuance of tax-exempt and/or taxable bonds of the Authority, through a financing structure deemed by the President upon the advice of the Vice President for Administration and Finance, and with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Board to be most beneficial and advantageous to the Public College, which structure may include the entering into by the Authority on behalf of the Public College one or more interest rate swaps (the "Swap") which payment obligations may begin at a future date specified in the Swap, said structure to be secured by a lease and agreement(s) (the "Agreement") and desires to authorize appropriate officers of the Public College to take all action necessary to accomplish the financing of the Project and the related financing costs; and

WHEREAS,

the Board desires to authorize the conveyance of land to the Authority, as applicable, upon which portions of the Project are to be located; and

WHEREAS,

the Public College reasonably expects to finance the Project as set forth on Project Priority List #1 and the other projects as set forth on Project Priority List #2 and #3 (collectively the "Project Priority Lists") on a long-

term basis with proceeds of a loan to the Public College from the Authority; and

WHEREAS.

the Public College may pay for certain costs of the Project and the projects listed on Project Priority List #2 and #3 ("Project Costs") with funds of the Public College that are not borrowed funds prior to the time such loan is made to the Public College by the Authority and prior to the time interim debt, if any, is incurred by the Public College for Project Costs; now therefore be it

RESOLVED.

BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Board hereby approves the construction of the Project in an amount not to exceed \$73,240,000 and financing of the Project through the Authority, in an amount necessary to cover the costs of the Project and all related financing costs.

SECTION 2. The Board hereby authorizes the President upon the advice of the Vice President for Administration and Finance, and with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Board, to determine and proceed with a financing structure deemed most beneficial and advantageous to the Public College, including the entering into by the Authority, on behalf of the Public College, a Swap which payment obligations to be made by the Public College thereunder may begin at a future date specified in the Swap.

SECTION 3. In order to finance the Project and the related financing costs, the Board hereby authorizes the Board to enter into an Agreement between the Authority and the Board, which Agreement shall secure repayment of the bonds to be issued by the Authority and any Swap to finance the Project and the related financing costs.

SECTION 4. The Agreement, in substantially the form to be provided, with such changes, omissions, insertions and revisions as shall be approved by the Authority and the hereinafter-authorized officers of the Public College is hereby approved. The Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, President, and the Vice President for Administration and Finance (the "Authorized Officers") are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Agreement in the name of and on behalf of the Board, in as many counterparts as may be necessary, and to affix or impress the official seal of the Public College thereon and to attest the same. Such execution and attestation to be conclusive evidence of the approval of the form and content of such Agreement.

SECTION 5. The Authorized Officers, are hereby authorized and directed to execute, deliver and approve any and all such other agreements, documents, certificates, directions and notices and to do and perform such acts and to take such actions as may be necessary or required or which the Authority may deem to be appropriate to implement the purposes of this resolution, to consummate the Project and the financing of the Project including the use of a Swap and the related financing costs by the Authority, and to effectuate the execution and delivery of the Agreement, and any other documentation necessary to effectuate the Project, or the financing of the Project including the use of a Swap and the related financing costs by the Authority. Any Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of and in the name of the Public College to attest and deliver said documentation and to affix the seal of the Public College to

- said documentation. Such execution and attestation to be conclusive evidence of the approval of the form and content of such documentation.
- SECTION 6. The Board hereby authorizes the conveyance of the land, as applicable, to be acquired by the Public College as part of the Project to the Authority and the conveyance of any other real property upon which portions of the Project is to be situated on.
- **SECTION 7.** The Board hereby approves the revised Project Priority Lists attached hereto.
- **SECTION 8.** The Board hereby approves the submission to the legislature for the acquisition, construction and/or financing of any of the non-revenue producing projects listed in Project Priority Lists.
- SECTION 9. This resolution is intended to be, and hereby is, a declaration of the Public College's official intent to reimburse the expenditure of Project Costs paid prior to the issuance of the bonds, and any interim borrowing to be incurred by the Public College, with proceeds of such debt, in accordance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2.
- SECTION 10. The maximum principal amount of bonds, or interim debt of the Public College, if any, expected to be issued to finance the Project Costs, including amounts to be used to reimburse the expenditure of Project Costs that are paid prior to the issuance of the bonds and interim debt of the Public College, if any, is in the respective amounts not to exceed those indicated on the attached Project Priority Lists.
- **SECTION 11.** All resolutions, orders and other actions of the Board in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution to the extent of such conflict are hereby superseded, repealed or revoked.
- **SECTION 12.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

This Resolution was passed by a majority of a quorum of the Board of the Trustees of The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey on June 14, 2006 and no further approvals are necessary to implement this Resolution.

AUTHORIZING THE RESTRUCTURING OF THE SWAP AGREEMENT RELATED TO THE NEW JERSEY EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES AUTHORITY REVENUE BONDS, THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY ISSUE, SERIES 2005 C

WHEREAS.

the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority (the "Authority") issued its Revenue Bonds, The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey Issue, Series 2005 C, in the amount of \$31,150,000 (the "2005 C Bonds") on March 4, 2005 for the purpose, inter alia, of financing or refinancing various capital projects on behalf of the College (the "2005 C Project"); and

WHEREAS.

the Authority, on behalf of the College, swapped a portion of the 2005 C Bonds, in the amount of \$15,550,000, pursuant to the ISDA Master Agreement, including the Schedule and the Credit Support Annex and the Confirmation thereto, each dated March 11, 2005 with Morgan Stanley Capital Services, Inc. and acknowledged by the College and XL Capital Assurance, the Bond Insurer (the "Swap Agreement"); and

WHEREAS,

the College has been informed that changes in market conditions may create opportunities to achieve significant cash flow and other benefits over the term of the Swap Agreement as a result of changing certain terms therein for purposes of determining the amount of regularly scheduled payments required to be paid by the swap counterparty (the "Swap Restructuring Opportunities");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE RICHARD STOCKTON COLLEGE OF NEW JERSEY AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1.
