Backfill/Decanted Renovations

<u>J-Wing</u> – This project consists of the renovation of Upper & Lower J-Wing in order to accommodate the delivery of administrative & academic space for the School of Education and the School of General Studies. It will also include the expansion of the Human Resources Department. The project's construction bid is complete and the work will begin the 2nd week of May.

Unified Science Center

To support the College's Sciences and Mathematics Programs, a three-story, 66,350 gross square foot building will be constructed. This building will include wet and dry laboratories, classrooms and support facilities. Structural steel is complete and the concrete floors have been poured. Our expectation is that the 1st Quarter of 2012 will consist primarily of construction of the building frame with project completion during the 2nd Quarter of 2013.

Solar Grant - American Reinvestment and Recovery Act

This project consists of the design and construction of solar energy panels mounted on canopies above the parking lots on the north side of campus. It also includes certain energy savings improvements to our residential housing units. A contract was awarded to a developer who will design, construct and own the project in order to sell electricity to Stockton at a below-market rate. Solar carports in the North Lot are now complete, energized and providing electricity to the housing complex.

Electrical Feeder Upgrade

This project consisted of the design and installation of additional electrical capacity that will enable the operation of the new Unified Science Center. This project is now complete and ready to be connected to the Unified Science Center building site at the appropriate time.

Hammonton Adaptive Reuse (SASI Project)

This project consists of the renovation of a three-story, 15,000 square foot former factory in downtown Hammonton, New Jersey. It will provide academic, retail and art gallery spaces for use by Stockton and the local community. The project is experiencing a delay in construction due to the original contractor entering into a contract default with the Town of Hammonton. The goal is to engage a new contractor such that the forecasted completion of fall 2012 is not compromised.

Manahawkin Academic Space

Stockton is collaborating with Atlanticare for the joint development of healthcare and academic space in the shore town of Manahawkin, with Stockton considering 6,000 to 10,000 square feet of academic space for our programming needs. This project is currently in the pre-construction phase. It is anticipated the contractor will begin mobilization towards the end of May 2012 working towards an August 2012 completion date, thus allowing for a September opening of the facility.

Azeez Museum

The College is now in possession of the Azeez Facility and is presently collaborating with the donor towards an academic addition for this space. Design efforts are underway to develop a two-classroom facility for occupancy August 2012. The project is currently in the pre-construction phase.

Pomona Community of Learning

The College is in the early stages of initiating a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a developer-led team to construct facilities that will provide up to 800 beds for on-campus residential housing. The location of the facility will be adjacent to the outdoor athletic fields along Pomona Road. We have engaged a "bridging" architect to ensure that the appropriate vision of the College is reflected within

the RFP document. Stockton's intent is to have this housing development available for occupancy in approximately two years.

Independence Walk Reconstruction Phase II

This project consists of the renovation of the balance of Independence Walk that was not completed in Phase I and includes the remaining courtyards. Construction bid documents have been assembled approved for permitting by the DCA and awaiting budget approval prior to bid.

Parking Lot & Outdoor Tennis Stadium Development

A feasibility study is underway to assess the possibility of advancing the further development of the Pomona Road Athletic Complex to include 8 tennis courts, observation stands and parking. With this effort, we are also considering the enhancement of core campus parking accommodations by renovation of existing tennis courts to become gated and secure parking lots.

Center for Sustainability

A design study is being undertaken to explore the development of a 6,000 sq. ft. academic facility for use by the newly created academic Sustainability Program. This facility will include spaces for a lecture hall, as well as lab space and be constructed with energy efficiency and sustainability in mind.

Campus Maintenance and In-House Projects

H113 & H114 Renovation

The space formerly occupied by the Art Gallery has been converted into two (2) electronic classrooms in anticipation for the fall 2012 semester.

I-Wing Corridor Improvements

A new entryway is being developed for the I-Wing corridor in order to cultivate a park-like setting, while allowing for material deliveries from Lakeside Lane and improving parking for service vehicles.

Ambassador William J. Hughes Memorabilia

The Department of Facility Planning and Plant Operations, in collaboration with the Graphics Department, worked to prominently display approximately one-hundred fifty (150) pieces of memorabilia throughout the newly renovated William J. Hughes Center for Public Policy, donated by Ambassador William J. Hughes.

The Call for Proposals for FY13 Research and Professional Development awards resulted in applications from 48 faculty members who requested a total of \$229,126. They requested an average award size of \$4,774; 39% of the applicants are tenured. Among the 48 proposals received, 19 (40%) indicated their projects supported the College's Strategic Initiatives. The Committee members were impressed with the strength of the proposals and the breadth of the applicant pool. Each year, it seems, the proposals become more competitive and we are grateful for the increase in funds this year so that more worthwhile projects could be supported.

Please find below the recommendations of the R&PD Committee to fund 41 projects with FY 13 awards, which represents support for 85% of the applications received. The committee members reviewed each proposal, and were assigned one third of the proposals for a close reading. Every proposal was fully discussed by the collective. In order to support the 41 projects recommended here, the Committee cut or did not support for funding a total of \$39,126 or 17% of the total amount requested. The Committee recommendations will keep the total amount of awards at the budget of \$190,000.

Recognizing that College budgets are spread thin and must compete with many needs, the Committee is especially pleased that you are able to increase funding for faculty scholarship which extends our academic work. Faculty are able to accomplish more when resources are available and we thank you for the opportunities this presents.

officials have determined that the long-term financial strength of the College would, under certain circumstances, be increased rather than diminished by borrowing funds in preference to withdrawing funds from the College's Investment Fund, specifically when rates of return from certain short-term investments would exceed the interest costs of utilizing funds secured

through a line of credit; and

WHEREAS, The College has negotiated favorable arrangements with Credit Suisse Bank

for such short-term borrowing, utilizing the College's Investment Fund as security for such borrowing (thus making the borrowing a Regulation U Loan);

and

WHEREAS, The Finance Committee and the Investment Committee recommend the

establishment of Regulation U Loan in the form of a line of credit from Credit

Suisse Bank; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees authorizes the President (and such other

person(s) as the President may designate in writing) to 1) negotiate, execute, deliver and perform under the loan documentation a Regulation U Loan with Credit Suisse Bank; 2) execute and deliver all such documents and instruments including any ancillary documents, instruments, certificates or other documents in connection therewith; and 3) take all such actions for and

in the name of the College and on the College's behalf.
