Construction has begun to replace nine (9) exterior stairwells and five (5) core elevators on the main academic campus. Work on this project is being phased to minimize the daily disruption to students, faculty and staff. This project is scheduled to be complete in the summer of 2015.

Renovations to Lower K-Wing (ARHU)

Construction is complete on the 3,000sf office renovation of Lower K-Wing. The architect is currently working on a design to improve the finishes in the K-Wing Gallery. Work on this project will be complete by the summer of 2015.

Site & Parking Lot Improvements

Plans have been submitted to the Pinelands Commission for their review and approval to expand the parking lot in front of the A&S Building by approximately 127 spaces. Work on this project is expected to begin in the spring of 2015 and be complete in the fall.

Unified Science Center 2 & New Academic Classroom Building

The University has contracted with Perkins Eastman to design 2 new building in accordance with the campus master plan. Both buildings are currently in design development with a groundbreaking expectation in the fall of 2015.

Annual Giving and Leadership Annual Giving

As of this writing, the Richard Stockton Society (donors who have contributed more than \$1,000 in the fiscal year) includes 202 members, including 70 new members at this level. At the same point in the previous giving year, the Richard Stockton Society included 130 members, 32 were new members.

The Constantelos Hellenic Collection and Reading Room construction fund ended the campaign with \$277,361 in gifts and commitments. The endowment for the collection and room now stands at \$94,415 in gifts and commitments In addition to these figures the appraised value of Dr. Constantelos' collection is \$146,470.

The campaign for the Hammonton Endowed Scholarship currently stands at \$42,850 in gifts and commitments.

Unrestricted donations to the Annual Fund totals \$131,196.11 (as of March 31, 2015). This total is up from \$96,760.74 in FY14, as of this date, and \$99,518.24 in FY13.

Direct mail for the 2014-2015 giving year, as of March 31, 2015, has resulted in donations from 393 unique donors totaling \$41,502. As a comparison, direct mail donations for the entire previous giving year totaled \$35,953 from 367 donors.

Phon-a-thon for the 2014-2015 giving year was completed on March 5, 2015 and resulted in pledges and outright gifts totaling \$76,407.34. A generous matching gift from an alumnus helped promote credit card gifts which saw an increase of 22% in both dollars and number of gifts from the fall to spring calling cycle.

The Research and Professional Development Committee, joined by Daniel Tomé and Merydawilda Colón, met Thursday, February 26 to discuss and vote on the proposals for the spring pilot round of scholarship of engagement funding. We reviewed 4 proposals for a total of \$26, 873 in requested funding. We recommend funding 2 projects for a total of \$11,573, which will leave \$13,027 of these pilot funds unspent.

These proposals, added to the four we recommended for funding in the fall, mean the pilot funding has now supported faculty members from 3 of the academic Schools (there were no proposals from ARHU, GENS, or the Library). The projects support research that furthers the scholarly goals of individual faculty members and engages with local organizations. Scholarship will include

- Studying the effects of medical marijuana use by patients for a community-based organization
- Investigating the number, experiences of, and needs of former foster youth enrolled at Stockton University and sharing this data with a regional group actively working to develop better support for these young men and women trying to earn college degrees

Fiscal Year 2016 R&PD Internal Grants Recommendations

The main Call for Proposals for FY16 Research and Professional Development resulted in complete applications from 45 faculty members who requested a total \$269,808.87 of the \$210,000 available for funding. They requested an average award size of \$5, 996 (compared to \$5,887 last year); 51% of the applicants are tenured (compared to 50% last year).

The committee members reviewed each proposal, and were assigned one fourth of the proposals for written feedback. Every proposal was fully discussed by the collective, then a secret vote by each member yielded a rank order of the proposals. Proposals were recommended for funding by School as follows: ARHU, 9 of 10 applicants; BUSN, 3 of 5 applicants; EDUC 2 of 2 applicants; GENS, 3 of 3 applicants; HLTH, 3 of 4 applicants; NAMS, 11 of 12 applicants, and SOBL, 7 of 7 applicants.

The committee recommends funding the following proposals, for \$210,023, twenty-three dollars over the available funding. We also recommend funding two strong proposals out of funds remaining from other rounds, if this would please be permitted. Specifically, we ask 1) that we can fund the following project with funds remaining from the Scholarship of Engagement round, as committee members agree that this project strongly meets the definition of scholarship of engagement. There are \$13,027 remaining in that pot, which could cover this project (and the extra twenty-three that we are over budget for the main round), and there would still be unspent money in the scholarship of engagement pot. Yesterday, I reached out to Daniel Tome and Awilda Colon about their support for this request, and I have already heard from Dr. Colon, who would support our recommending funding the project out of those funds should it be approved by the administration.

Dear Provost Kesselman,

A subcommittee of the Research and Professional Development Committee met yesterday to review 16 proposals, requesting \$27,873.16 in funding, largely for conference travel, but also to index a book and for a few other project-related items. We had \$7,500 remaining in the Provost Opportunity Funds, which had been reserved for projects in this final quarter. We cut heavily, as was clearly necessary given the gap between available funds and requested funds. First, we eliminated weaker proposals entirely and removed all per diem and local travel requests. Then we subtracted \$337 from each proposal in order to provide some funding to the remaining projects.

In addition, we hope to fund one of the stronger proposals, that of Shelly Meyers, EDUC, entitled "Teacher and Faculty Collaboration to Improve Academic Performance of Students with Disabilities: A Case Study" for \$2,000 out of the remaining (\$7,000) unspent Scholarship of Engagement Funding, given that her conference presentation comes out of scholarship of engagement work she's been doing with local school districts. Merydawilda Colon and Daniel Tome both also support this suggestion. Please let us know if you do not support this recommendation, as then we'll need to make further cuts to our recommendations (in the table on the following page).

As always, we thank the Deans for being prepared to lend their support to so many proposals, both those we supported and those we did not, and for adding comments to several proposals that provided us with additional information. Thanks, too, to the Provost and President for providing these funds. Their presence is especially valuable in this final quarter to support travel and other needs when School budgets have been more heavily exhausted.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF STOCKTON UNIVERSITY APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE RESTRUCTURING OF CERTAIN EXISTING REVENUE BONDS ISSUED BY THE NEW JERSEY EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES AUTHORITY ON BEHALF OF THE UNIVERSITY; APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN AUTHORIZED OFFICERS TO EFFECT THE RESTRUCTURING OR REFUNDING TO THE EXTENT SUCH REFUNDING RESULTS IN INTEREST RATE SAVINGS TO THE UNIVERSITY; AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN OFFICERS OF THE UNIVERSITY TO TAKE ANY AND ALL ACTIONS DEEMED NECESSARY OR DESIRABLE IN CONNECTION WITH SUCH RESTRUCTURING AND SUCH REFUNDING

- whereas, the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority (the "Authority") was created pursuant to the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority Law, P.L. 1967, c. 271, N.J.S.A. 18A:72A-1 et seq., as amended and supplemented (the "Act") and authorized to issue its obligations to provide a means for New Jersey public and private colleges and universities to obtain financing to construct educational facilities as defined in the Act; and
- pursuant to the Act, the Authority has issued its Revenue Bonds, Stockton University Issue, Series 2005 F in the original aggregate principal amount of \$28,180,000 (the "2005 F Bonds") to fund the following for Stockton University (the "University"); (i) advance refund the University's Series 1996 F Bonds (the Multipurpose Recreation Center) for the principal amount of \$17,750,000, and the University's Series 1998 C Bonds (Housing IV) for the principal amount of \$11,875,000; (ii) the payment of costs and expense in connection with the issuance of the Series 2005 F Bonds and the University issued its Revenue Bonds, Stockton University Issue, Series 2006 F in the original aggregate principal amount of \$50,365,000 (the "2006 F Bonds") to fund the following for the University; (i) fund various capital projects including Housing V Phase I, Energy Conservation Projects, Land Acquisitions, Holocaust Resource Center Renovation, Alton Auditorium Renovation, and Electrical Power Upgrades, (ii) pay capitalized interest, and (iii) the payment of costs and expense in connection with the issuance of the Series 2006 F Bonds; and
- whereas, the 2005 F Bonds consist of \$23,810,000 Serial Bonds bearing interest rates between 4-5% with the average being 4.45% and \$4,370,000 5% Term Bonds and are insured by Ambac Assurance Corporation; and the 2006 F Bonds consist of \$26,560,000 Serial Bonds with interest rates between 3.65 5.00%, a \$9,395,000 Term Bond due 2031 with an interest rate of 5.00%, and a \$14,410,000 Term Bond due 2036 with an interest rate of 4.25% and are insured by MBIA; and
- WHEREAS, the University, in conjunction with the Authority, will investigate various restructuring alternatives for the 2005 F Bonds and 2006 Series F Bonds; and
- whereas, after consideration of applicable alternatives, the University will determine if it is advisable and beneficial to the University and the University's students to undertake such a restructuring; and
- whereas, in May 2008, the Board had determined it beneficial to refund Series 2005 F Bonds and 2006 Series F Bonds in order to take advantage of favorable market conditions and so the Board has determined that it is advisable to be able to take advantage of current opportunities which may be presented because of market conditions to refund any or all of the 2005 F Bonds and 2006 Series F Bonds in order to achieve debt service savings; and
- whereas, the Board has determined that it is advisable to authorize the "Designated Officers" as defined herein, in consultation with the Authority and its financial advisors to determine to restructure any and all of the 2005 F Bonds and 2006 Series F Bonds, provided that such refunding results in the required level of debt service savings; and
- WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the Restructuring will assist in serving the needs of the University's students and in providing a benefit to the University; and

whereas, the Board has also determined that the undertaking of the refunding of any or all of the 2005 F Bonds and the 2006 Series F Bonds as determined and selected by the Authorized Officers through restructuring and refunding and the payment of the costs of implementing such refunding in order to achieve debt service savings will assist in serving the needs of the University's students and in providing a benefit to the University; and

whereas, in order to implement the Restructuring and the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds efficiently and effectively, the Board has determined that it is necessary and advisable to authorize appropriate officers to undertake all necessary and appropriate actions in order to implement the Restructuring and the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds; and

WHERAS, in connection with the Restructuring and the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds, it may be necessary for the University to enter into one or more lease and agreements (collectively, the "Lease and Agreement") in order to secure the repayment of bonds issued by the Authority in connection with the Restructuring and Refunding, and the Board desires to authorize certain officers of the Board and the University to approve the form of and execute and deliver the Lease and Agreement and such other documents as may be necessary and to take any and all action necessary to implement the Restructuring and Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds and the financing thereof and all costs related thereto;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF STOCKTON UNIVERSITY AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The Board hereby approves and authorizes the undertaking and implementation of the Restructuring. The President, with the advice of the Vice-President for Administration and Finance and with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Board are hereby authorized to modify or add to the items included in the refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds provided that the modification is related to the refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds.
- The President, the Vice-President for Administration and Finance, and the Assistant Vice-President for Finance (the "Authorized Officers") are hereby authorized and directed to approve the form of and execute and deliver either a private placement or the Lease and Agreement relating to the 2015 Restructure and Refunding, any refunding agreements necessary to evidence the refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds, a contract of purchase, a continuing disclosure agreement and any other agreement, document or instrument necessary in connection with the Restructuring in the name of and on behalf of the Board of the University, in the form approved by the Authorized Officer executing the same, in as many counterparts as may be necessary, and the Board Secretary or any other Authorized Officer is hereby authorized to affix or impress the official seal of the University thereon and to attest the same such execution and attestation being conclusive evidence of the approval thereof.
- The Authorized Officers are hereby authorized and directed to execute, deliver and approve any and all such other documents, certificates, directions and notices and to do and perform such acts and to take such other actions as may be necessary or required or which the Authority may deem to be appropriate to implement the Restructuring and the purposes of this Resolution including payment of the costs thereof and to effectuate the issuance of the Current Refunding Bonds and to execute and deliver any refunding agreements and any other documentation necessary to effectuate the Restructuring and purposes of this Resolution including any necessary amendments to existing documents. The Board Secretary or any other Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of and in the name of the University, to attest and deliver said documentation and to affix the seal of the University to said documentation.
- Section 4. The Board hereby approves and authorizes the undertaking an implementation of the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds authorizes and directs the Chairperson of the Board, the President or the Vice-President for Administration and Finance (each a "Designated Officer") to determine whether to implement the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006

Series F Bonds; provided that implementation of the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds results in net present value debt savings of at least 3% with respect to the Bonds to be Refunded.

- Section 5. The Designated Officers are hereby authorized to determine the structure of the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds, including without limitation the details of the Refunding Bonds or private placement and all other details thereof as the Designated Officers determine are in the best interest of the University taking into account the financial condition of the University and market conditions in effect at the time the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds is implemented.
- Section 6. The Authorized Officers are hereby authorized and directed to approve the form of and execute and deliver the Lease and Agreement or documents relating to the private placement related to the Refunding Bonds, the continuing disclosure agreement, a contract of purchase and any other documents, certificates or instruments necessary to implement the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds in the name of and on behalf of the Board of the University, in the form approved by the Authorized Officer executing the same, in as many counterparts as may be necessary, and the Board Secretary or any other Authorized Officer is hereby authorized to affix or impress the official seal of the University thereon and to attest the same such execution and attestation being conclusive evidence of the approval thereof.
- The Authorized Officers are hereby authorized and directed to execute, deliver and approve any and all such other documents, certificates, directions and notices and to do and perform such acts and to take such other actions as may be necessary or required or which the Authority may deem to be appropriate to implement the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds and the purposes of this Resolution including payment of the costs thereof and to effectuate the issuance of the Refunding Bonds and to execute and deliver any other documentation necessary to effectuate the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or the 2006 Series F Bonds and purposes of this Resolution including any necessary amendments to existing documents. The Board Secretary or any other Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of and in the name of the University, to attest and deliver said documentation and to affix the seal of the University to said documentation.
- (a) The Authority reasonably expects the University to reimburse its expenditure of any costs of Section 8. refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or 2006 Series F Bonds prior to the issuance of the Current and/or Advance Refunding Bonds or the 2015 Bonds with proceeds of the Current and/or Advance Refunding Bonds or the 2015 Bonds. (b) This resolution is intended to be and hereby is a declaration of official intent to reimburse the expenditures for any such costs of refunding the 2005 F Bonds and/or 2006 Series F Bonds paid prior to the issuance of the Current Refunding Bonds or the 2015 Bonds with the proceeds of the Current and/or Advance Refunding Bonds or the 2015 Bonds in accordance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. (c) The maximum principal amount of Current and/or Advance Refunding Bonds and 2015 Bonds expected to be issued to finance the Restructuring (including costs of issuance and any costs of refunding the 2005 F Bonds) and the 2015 Bonds may be issued in one or more series and in one or more transactions. (d) The costs of the Restructuring and the 2015 Bonds to be reimbursed with the proceeds of the Bonds will be "capital expenditures, a cost of issuance of such bonds or extraordinary working capital items" in accordance with the meaning of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. (e) No reimbursement allocation will employ an "abusive arbitrage device" under Treasury Regulations Section 1.148-10 to avoid the arbitrage restrictions or to avoid the restrictions under Sections 142 through 147 of the Code. The proceeds of the Current Refunding Bonds and the 2015 Bonds used to reimburse for Project Costs, or funds corresponding to such amounts, will not be used in a manner that results in the creation of "replacement proceeds," including "sinking funds," "pledged funds," or funds subject to a "negative pledge" (as such terms are defined in Treasury Regulations Section 1.148-1) of the Current Refunding Bonds and the 2015 Bonds or another issue of debt obligations of the Authority, other than amounts deposited into a "bona fide debt service fund" (as defined in Treasury Regulations Section 1.148-1). (f) All reimbursement allocations will occur not later than 18 months after the later of (i) the date the expenditure from a source other than the Current and/or Advance Refunding Bonds and the 2015 Bonds is paid, or (ii) the date the Project is

"placed in service" (within the meaning of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2) or abandoned, but in no event more than 3 years after the expenditure is paid.

- Section 9. Any and all prior actions of any Authorized Officer in furtherance of the Restructuring or the Refunding of the 2005 F Bonds and/or 2006 Series F Bonds are hereby ratified and confirmed.
- Section 10. This Resolution will take effect immediately.
